



The response has been phenomenal! A dozen people showed up for the organizational meeting for our *Helping Hands* food pantry, and numerous others who couldn't make the meeting have offered their assistance. THANK YOU!

We did highlight several needs at the meeting, one of which is **built in wooden shelving** for canned food storage. We're looking for functional shelving—not custom made hardwood furniture. If you have a radial arm saw and can transform planks of wood into a sturdy structure that's attached to the wall, we need your help! As you've noticed, the church is markedly brighter, thanks to some new LED bulbs in the fixtures.

If you're wondering what difference this increased brightness has upon the *carbon footprint* that we're leaving behind, I think you'll be rather impressed.

- While the church itself uses 81 watts more power than before, the two entryways use 162 watts LESS with the LED bulbs. So, on Sunday mornings with the church and foyers aglow, we've actually **LESSE** our carbon footprint!
- On weekdays, our carbon footprint is even more significantly reduced. Will all the fixtures on, the chapel now uses 192 watts LESS than before. And, when Fr. Reymann turns on the foyer lights, we're using a total of 273 watts less than before.

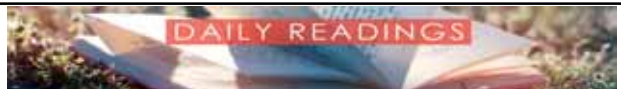

For many years it was imperative that everyone pick up a bulletin on their way into church because the hymn numbers (and often the lyrics of at least one song) were contained therein. But for more than a year now, the hymn numbers have been posted on the board and we no longer publish lyrics (because it's illegal to do so without purchasing a reprint license, which St. Pat's has never done).

As discussed during our Liturgy Lessons, the time prior to Mass is intended to allow us to prayerfully set the worries, frustrations, and cares of the world aside—and focus ourselves upon the Lord and His will for us in our lives. Some do this with the assistance of their prayer book or a rosary, others may kneel in prayer, and still others choose to sit quietly with eyes closed.

Reading through the pastor's column or other articles of the bulletin before Mass does little to focus us on the Lord whom we've come to worship. If anything, it distracts us from what we ought be doing prior to the start of Mass. To help us focus on our private prayer before Mass, bulletins are now set out following Mass—rather than before Mass.

If, on the way out of church, you happen to grab two bulletins instead of one → DON'T return it; instead, take it home and share it with a friend or neighbor who doesn't attend St. Pat's!
